


BILL BRUNNER OFFICIALLY IN THE PRIMARIES

our boys fighting abroad cannot be entrusted to such congressmen."
Brunner reviewed his career in public office, calling attention to the fact that he served 14 years in the State Legislature and Congress in addition to his services in municipal and borough offices.
"During that time," he said, "I have aligned myself with the progressive and liberal ideals of the leaders of this state and nation."
"No man should be elected today who is not 100 per cent behind the policies and aims of President Roosevelt. Full support of our commander in chief will hasten the end of the war."
"Only such complete support," he added, "will assure a just peace and permit our boys to return to their land, the liberties and ideals of which have been preserved, and to a country from which the spectre of unemployment and the spectre of want have been banished."
Brunner outlined his sentiments as follows:
"I am 100 per cent behind the Four Freedoms expressed in the Atlantic Charter and behind the lofty ideals expressed by Vice-President Henry A. Wallace in his plan for a just world after the war."
Brunner concluded his statement by saying:
"It is up to the people of Queens to decide whether the security of the country can best be entrusted to men whose records show consistent loyalty to the President or to those who obstructed the American effort before Pearl Harbor."
Brunner's entry into the campaign was the outstanding development in the political picture up to the mid-night deadline for substituting names on designating petitions.
The Labor Party, through Harry J. Chapman of Hollis, country leader, substituted, in addition to Brunner's name, those of James F. Fitzgerald of St. Albans, the Democratic designee for the State Senate in the 2nd District, and Senator Peter T. Farrell of East Elmhurst, Democratic designee for reelection in the 3rd District.
Chapman said the ALP at first had considered supporting Senator Seymour Halpern of Kew Gardens, incumbent Republican, in the 2nd District, but had been precluded from doing so by County Republican Leader Warren B. Ashmead's opposition to third party support.
Halpern thus will have to run solely as a Republican although he has sponsored numerous bills supported by the Labor Party.
James W. Walsh of Forest Hills, Queens salvage campaign chairman, is another Democrat who will have Labor Party support. He is a candidate for the Assembly in the 6th District. The seat is now held by George Archinal, Glendale Republican.




EDWARD R. CARMAN


DR. JAMES F. BENDER



JOBLESS MAN CUTS HIS THROAT

Hugo David Isaacs, 33, of 43-15 45th street, Sunnyside, died in an ambulance on the way to St. John's Hospital this morning after he had slashed his throat from ear to ear with a razor.

Mrs. Isaacs said her husband had been despondent over inability to find a job.

His companions ran for help a quarter of a mile away.
Patrolman John C. Trauth dived 10 times before he found the boy's body. In this case, too, artificial respiration was attempted in vain.

May Use Dynamite

Lieutenant Walter Klotzbach of the Emergency Service Division said today that dynamite may be used in the search for the Manicacalco boy's body.
Plans to use a diver were abandoned because of the murkiness of the water and the fact that the pond bottom is so muddy that a man would have difficulty in moving about.

3 Alarms Turned In

Inconsequential fires were started by the bolts but none required the services of the Fire Department, although three alarms were turned in.

The rain came just as the mercury climbed to an official high of 91 at 6 P. M., high mark for the year which equalled the record for the date, set in 1927.
"It was several degrees above that in the street."
After the storm, the mercury dropped to 82 and the Weatherman's forecast for tonight is fair and cooler.

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Health Vital Statistics Issued for Last Week

Deaths from all causes reported in Queens last week numbered 190. This was a decrease of 22 from the previous week and the fewest for any week so far this year.
Two hundred and ninety-one births were recorded, a decrease of 37.
Eleven new cases of whooping cough were reported, a decrease of 19 from the week before; eight new cases of scarlet fever; a decrease of five; seven new cases of measles, a decrease of seven; one new case of typhoid fever, an increase of one.
One death was charged to whooping cough.
Eight new cases of pneumonia, along with six deaths, were reported. This was a decrease of two cases, but an increase of two deaths.
Two deaths were attributed to automobile accidents, as against four in the previous week. Up to date there have been 58 such deaths in the borough.
