Private Roy Schlote, a young American soldier born in Utah and trained in Germany as a "youth missionary," Schlote, questioned by Assistant United States Attorney Frank J. Parker, testified that he was picked for the work while visiting Germany in 1938, and trained there in preparation for his return to the United States.

In a youth camp near Berlin, he said, he studied military science for six weeks, and learned the principles of national socialism, particularly the art of instilling Nazi ideals in the heads of his young contemporaries in America.

Returning to this country, he testified, he went on a lecture tour which took him around a circuit of youth movement groups until early in 1940, when he said, he "saw the error of his ways."

Schlote then turned his back on his German education, he said, withdrew from the youth movement and was inducted into the Army early in the war.

**Hotbed of Bund**

Long Island was a hotbed of the Bund with its satellite "youth movement" flourished here like a barnyard weed. Schlote was well-known in Bund circles at Ridgewood, Astoria, Jamaica and in the Nassau-Suffolk area.

Another government witness is Victor F. Ridder, publisher of the New Yorker Staats-Zeitung, German language daily. He testified that as early as 1933, the Nazis tried to "muscle in" and dictate his editorial policies.

Ridder said he told the Hitler emissaries that "they were trying to get away with something that even the Congress of the United States could not do, dictate to the free press," and he ordered them out of the office.

**FINNS MAY SEND ENVOY TO RUSSIA**

STOCKHOLM (UP)—The newspaper Tidningen said today there had been an "important development" in Finland's efforts to arrange a separate peace with Russia and another dispatch implied that it might lead to the departure of a special envoy to Moscow.

The development came yesterday, Tidningen said, and Finland is expected to issue a communique relating to it today.

The dispatch said the development was believed to involve a new move by Finland, but did not elaborate further. The communique was scheduled for release last night, but was postponed without explanation, Tidningen said.

Other sources said Finland, in a note to Moscow Monday, rejected three of the six conditions laid down by Russia for an armistice and it was possible that the new development mentioned by Tidningen stemmed from Russia's reply.

A vaguely-worded dispatch from the Helsinki correspondent of the newspaper Svenska Dagbladet hints that the reply had been received in Helsinki and that it was at least not entirely negative since the correspondent expected soon to be able to "discuss a prominent person's travelling plans."

This might mean that former Premier Juho K. Paasikivi of Finland, who initiated peace discussions with Moscow, Alexander Kolliantai, Soviet ambassador to Sweden, at Stockholm, might be planning to leave for Moscow to continue the talks.

**NOXON TRIAL IS CALLED OFF**

PITTSFIELD, Mass. (UP)—A military trial today was called off because of the illness of a juror.

Superior Judge Abraham E. Pinski dismissed the jury that has heard evidence for nine days after reading the report of three physicians who agreed that Juror E. Cullen, 54, was unable to continue to serve.

Cullen suffered a relapse yesterday after being stricken with grippe and pleurisy a week ago. His original attack caused a one-day postponement.

Defense Attorney Joseph B. Ely, former governor of Massachusetts, refused to agree to continuation of the trial with an 11-man jury. There were no alternates.

**Couple Get \$17,000 For Auto Injuries**

A jury in Queens Supreme Court, Jamaica, yesterday awarded Mrs. Norma E. Hansen, 30, of 118-35 235th street, St. Albans, \$12,500 for injuries suffered in an automobile accident on June 20, 1943.

Her husband, Daniel A. Hansen, 30, a city fireman, injured in the same accident, was awarded \$2,000 for personal injuries and \$2,500 for expenses and loss of his wife's services. Hansen had sued for \$10,000 and his wife asked for \$50,000.

Elizabeth Ribbe of 188-40 120th road, St. Albans, owner, and Edward Ribbe, her husband, also a fireman, and driver of the car in which the Hansens were riding, and Pincus Rothstein of 204 Broadway, Lawrence, owner, and Joseph Rothstein, 20, driver of the other car involved in the collision, were defendants. The jury exonerated the Ribbes and directed the entire verdict against the Rothsteins. Justice James T. Hallinan of Flushing, presided.

The Ribbe car was going east on Baisley boulevard, Jamaica, when it was struck by the Rothstein automobile at the intersection of New York boulevard.

Ribbe's car was overturned, throwing Mrs. Hansen out of the automobile.

town of 16,300 persons, would knock out the anchor of a German salient extending into the Soviet flank, while the loss of Proskurov would force the enemy to fall back across the Dniester into Rumania for communication with 500,000 Nazi troops isolated in the lower Dnieper bend.

Front reports said Zhukov was approaching the second and final objective of his offensive, the complete rupture of the German southern front and the splitting of the German armies in the western and southern Ukraine. The first objective was accomplished with the severing of the double trunk railway way between Odessa and Uarsaw.

**Last Link Menaced**

The Russians reached to within seven miles northwest of Proskurov, next key junction on the Odessa-Warsaw line, with the capture of Gruznavitsa, 59 miles north of Rumania, an 18-mile advance along the north bank of the Dniester River. Capture of Proskurov would cut a single railway line that loops below the severed portion of the Odessa-Warsaw line and is the last link north of Rumania between the southern and western Ukraine.

The capture of Gruznavitsa and Cherny Ostrov, four miles to the northwest, extended the Red army's control of the Odessa-Warsaw railway to a 33-mile stretch between Proskurov and Tarnopol. Two German regiments totalling perhaps 6,000 men were routed at Cherny Ostrov and large numbers of guns, mortars and war supplies were captured.

**Zhmerinka Threatened**

Zhukov's forces broke into the outskirts of Staro-Konstantinov, 24 miles northeast of Proskurov, yesterday after capturing towns two miles east, four northwest and seven southeast. Up to 3,000 German soldiers killed and 25,000 self-propelled guns destroyed in what the Soviet high command called "especially fierce fighting."

The east wing of the 1st Ukrainian Army increased the threat to Zhmerinka, another junction of the Odessa-Warsaw trunk line, with the seizure of Volovitsky, 41 miles to the north and 17 miles northeast of Orskurov.

In one sector, the Germans counter-attacked with 100 tanks, but fell back to their initial positions after losing 42 of them.

Altogether, the 1st Ukrainian Army captured 100 towns and villages yesterday for a five-day total of more than 1,000.

In northern Estonia, the Germans retreated in disorder after losing 900 men and three tanks in a futile battle to block near Narva. Soviet planes added to the toll of men and machines with a series of heavy raids. Eleven German planes were shot down and 32 destroyed on the ground.

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**DID FCC CAUSE PEARL HARBOR?**

WASHINGTON (UP)—Congressional opponents of the Federal Communications Commission said today they still are not satisfied that the FCC was not at least partially responsible for the Pearl Harbor disaster, despite denials by FCC Chairman James L. Fly.

Fly was called today for the third straight day before the special house committee investigating his agency, and was expected to be questioned about his asserted refusal to turn over FCC fingerprint files to the FBI for loyalty checks of radio operators on merchant ships.

During previous hearings FBI Chief J. Edgar Hoover identified more than a dozen letters requesting the files and tacitly admitted that the files had not received them until months after the nation was at war.

Fly, in his first two days' testimony before the committee, denied that the FCC was responsible for continuation of Japanese language broadcasts from Hawaii before Pearl Harbor. He denied also that military information was transmitted by the Japanese by any means other than ordinary commercial channels which were open to them.

**London Awaits Pact For Jugoslav Talks**

LONDON (UP)—King Peter of Yugoslavia is expected to arrive here from Cairo to confer with British officials in an attempt to settle differences between the government and the Partisan forces under Marshal Josip (Tito) Brozovic, well informed quarters reported today.

At the same time, Great Britain conveyed to the Polish government-in-exile here Russia's dissatisfaction with its statement regarding the question of a new frontier between the two countries.

Diplomatic sources reported that Premier Bohdzihar Puritch and Interior Minister Vladeta Milicewitch of the royal Yugoslav exile government were expected to accompany the 20-year-old King to London.

**Story of Beating Called 'False'**

ALBANY (UP)—Charges that a Negro witness in the Albany county investigation had been beaten by Governor Dewey's investigators and state police were described as "wholly false" today by Edward R. Finch, retired associate judge of the Court of Appeals.

Finch returned the complaint made by "Sonny" Jones, a witness, in a lengthy report to Attorney General Nathaniel L. Goldstein at the conclusion of a two-day inquiry. The former judge, however, pointed out that Jones and his counsel, Morris Zuckman, had refused to give him their story.

**F. D. Praises Rescue Of Jewish Children**

President Roosevelt, expressing the hope that rescue of Jewish children from the Nazis would continue, said today that "the coming liberation of Europe will present us with unparalleled problems."

"We must help broken bodies, reeling shattered lives and faith," Mr. Roosevelt said in a message to Henrietta Szold, founder of Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization, praising the work of the Youth Aliyah in aiding Jewish children to escape the Nazis.

**BECHLIDDT PLEADS GUILTY**

hand battles had been in progress Monday and Tuesday night.

Canadian combat patrols on the Eighth Army's Adriatic front engaged Nazi skirmishers in the Tolfo sector three miles northwest of Ortona and Polish artillery shelled enemy units around Aleteta.

Poor visibility over most of Italy grounded the U. S. 15th Air Force's heavy bombers, but hard-hitting American Marauders and Mitchells picked up the attack with a series of smashing raids on Nazi supply routes in the suburbs of Rome to San Stefano harbor, 80 miles northwest of the Italian capital.

Headquarters spokesmen said poor visibility had prevented full observation of the damage inflicted on the Tiburtina yards yesterday, but they reported that the recent series of raids on the network of railway yards in the Rome area had "severely damaged" the yards' vital clearing points for German troops and supplies moving southward to the fighting fronts.

Marauder crews who participated in Tuesday's raid on the Ostiense yards in the southern outskirts of Rome said the entire target area was littered with smashed freight cars and bursted rails from previous assaults. Some 250 cars were believed to have been destroyed or damaged heavily last Friday when the Marauders caught 1,000 cars jammed in the yards.

German warplanes struck back at the Allied beachhead lines Tuesday night in a series of anti personnel bombs over the American and British ground troops, but it was indicated the attack was on a small scale.

Another small formation of German planes lashed out across the Mediterranean at dusk yesterday to Algiers in its first raid since last August. The raid lasted only about 10 minutes, however, and there were no major damage or casualties.

The Luftwaffe's biggest effort was hurled against an Allied convoy moving along the North African coast about the same time as the coasters attacked. Between 50 and 60 German planes struck at the convoy, but they were driven off before causing any damage.
