"GIRL OF THE PERIOD" IN DEFENCE OF HER CLASS.

Macmillan's Magazine publishes an article from a lady who, though she is styled a Girl of the Period, is by no means the creature popularly known by that name. This young ady writes of the distressing condition to which balls have reduced her associates, and seems to be well acquainted with the fripperies of the day; but to judge from her essay (which incidentally touches on history, economical laws; science, and the educational influence of good works), she must have given no small portion of her nights and days to other pur-suits than the girl-of-the-period wiles and vanities. But she is sufficiently concerned with them to feel that the criticism that has been levelled at her Belgravian sisters must have an answer. To do this with effect she has to confess to a great deal, "We know," she says, 'none better, the deep degradation of the life we live; but none but God and our own hearts can tell how bitter is the struggle in most cases before we submit in utter hopelessness to the yoke imposed on us by fashion." And then she plunges vigorously into the subject; declaring that girls of well-to-do families have no choice but to be dissipated. to catch husbands, to retire into a monastic institution. Girls of the Byronic epoch, who were supposed to have no appetite for food, and whose lot it was to lie on sofas and read the "Corsair," were not so badly off; for nowa-days a young woman has her muscles well ordered by riding, driving, walking, and must find some exercise for this additional "power and energy." If she is well inclined, she casts about for means of using to good purpose her superfluous vitality. The parish school first presents riself. But trained teachers come setween her and the work; mamms finds that the place "is close," or that the scarlatina haunts the premises; so that quarter is shut up. Similar obstructions come between her and any active display of charity towards the indigent. She next tries books and the improvement of her mind-in vain. Mamma again interposes, fears her dear child is getting blue " or "morbid," and prescribes "a ball. The balls are very pleasant at first, but after a while one begins to despise oneself for liking them, and to remember the church. The candid girl from Belgravia informes us-(hear it, ye curates of the west and the southwest!) "that the real reason why church-going has been so popular of late is because it supplies an imaginary duty to fill up hours for which garls really can find no other harmless occupation." But then, though they go for distraction they remain for repentance. They are awakened from the pulpit; and next comes the question of comfort for the stricken conscience. Is it to be High Church or Roman? Is it to be "the vail"? Reaction sets in upon the whole question Our young lady wearies of conjectures, and plunges once more into the whirl of society. For a season the resource suffices; and then again a weariness of spirit follows. Here we arrive at the crisis,

tue slighted, of the loveliness of the married state, of the glorious functions of the Christian life. Further on the young lady invites us to contemplate the interior orders, comprehending the middle dasses. For them the craft of book writing is within reach; they can paint for money; they can become physicians. Yet we in Belgravia can do not one of these things. It is a mission, rerhaps, to suppose that authorship is a pursuit confined to the middle classes; if our young lady and her friends require high precedent for that diversion or pursuit, they can find enough of it to make them easy on the score of fashion. Whether a lady in her own right can become a female artist is a question not so clearly settled; whether any lady ought to prescribe physic, &c., is a question not settled at all, even amongst the middle classes. We cannot. however, but respect the feeling which prompts a resolution to write, to paint, or to vaccinate, sooner than indulge "in luxury and vice." What do you want us to be, she exclaims? Leaders of fashion refined "to the uttermost" by literature and art, future mothers of statesmen and heroes, for which end the mind of the mother must be "enlightened by history and ennobled by patriotism. Alas! if you expect this you will be grievously disappointed. It lies, this aspiration to lead the fashion and to nurse the heroes and the statesmen of the country, at the bottom of the Belgravian girls' hearts; but how can they go about the business if they are not permitted to nekethe remotest preparation for it? Instead cicarefully and specially training those whose ratural function it is to produce all our field marshals and bishops and chancellors, "we begin at the wrong end." We should have commenced with "the upper ranks of society. At this point our young lady makes some very sensible remarks, one of which is, that if girls had the chance of making genuine friends amongst each other, they would not so readily seek the solace of the confessional. The educational advantages of the middle classes are treated in a spirit of sound criticism and natural envy. She thinks that the Ladies' College should not attempt to teach everything, and that that institution would be the salvation of numbers of young ladies subjected to the moral and mental enervation of evening parties. Why! oh, why! criesthe Belgravian, are we not allowed to work like these others. the middle classes-like yourselves, you who read this, and write and talk so harshly about us! We are permitted to spend papa's money -at least, "society only considers it a venial offence, but a very black crime that she should do profitable work with her brains." This is currons if true : and if we will not allow the Belgravian girl to use her brains, then at least, she saks, may she not be permitted to enliat "a standing army of charity in which each should have her distinct post and allotted task"? Her emotions, her sentiments, her ambitions could all be nourished in this way. This is, in fact, a plen for sisterhoods, and fol lows rather lamely after the writer's flourishing little preface. Nor are we convinced by this ingenious young lady that fashionable women are really so dreadfully bored and disgusted with their lot. It is as much a sham to describe them as mentally tortured in this style as it is to depict them as painting, flirting, slangy crestures alone, loving nothing much, and detesting children particularly. They do not live "in a vortex," as the phrase is, nor are their hearts torn with remorse because they cannot bring up our dukes as they ought to be brought up, or lead the fashion as it ought to be led by proficients in art, science, and literature. That a good many girls may be sorry for having nothing to do is very likely; it is quite conseivable that some may be at heart ashamed of their flaily life, but Macmillan's "Girl of the Period" represents only a few of her sisterhood.

The Ballet. The Ballet is almost always associated with comic, or at least mirthful, incidents; that is to say, it is properly an appendage of comedy, and not of tragedy; and it evidently pertains to that species of comedy which Mr. Thackeray his described so happily in his lecture upon Congreve. This is not the comedy of humour, nor the comedy of satire, but the comedy of pleasure; of reckless jovial enjoyment; of epicurean dissipation, perpetual gaiety, and wanton frolic. Now we all know what have been the stage traditions upon this subject from the time of Plantus to the time of M. Planche. We cannot describe them better than in Mr. Thackeray's own language.

"I fear the theatre carries down that ancient tradition and worship as masons have carried their secret signs and rites from temple to temple. When the libertine has carried off the beauty in the play, and the dotard is laughed to scorn for having the young wife; in the ballad, when the poet bids his mistress gather roses while she may, and warns her that old time is still a-flying;... ... when harlequin. splendid in youth, strength, and agility, dances danger down; when Mr. Phnch, that godless old rebel, breaks every law, and laughs at it with odious triumph, &c., don't you see in the comedy, in the song, in the dance, in the ragged little Punck puppet-show, the Pagan protest? Doesn't it seem as if life puts in its plea,

and sings its comment?" The spirit of this comedy is lawlessness; the constant protest of the animal nature of man overflowing with hilarity and health, against all restraints and all precepts. Now the ballet is the very culminating ombodiment of this idea. When the troop of nymphs come floating gracefully on to the stage do they not at once suggest it? Youth, and love, and beauty; dancing singing, and feast-ing; a life of voluptuous softness and Paphian slumbers, unbroken by a single toil, untroubled by a single care, and unencumbered by any of those vexatious scruples and grovelling perjudices with which the commonplace work-aday world so needlessly torments itself? Why else those languishing glances, and lascivious gestures, those alluring tones, and those engaging attitudes? Do they not seem to sing to us the universal song of the sirens: Come to the arms of beauty; come to the bowers of love : come with the thyrans and the chaplet ; come with the lute and the flask; turn your backs upon eare and labour, upon the tumbling billow and the groaning our; come to the fairy groves; come to the golden islands; come to

the gardens of the houris; or any other place

which the taste of the author may have suggest-This we say, is the ture significance of the ballet, as the special exponent of the comedy of pleasure. It is these immemorial associations connected with it that invest its costume with an aspect so repugnant to deceney. If we saw a woman dressed in the style for the performance of an athletic feast, we should think nothing of it. But when we see it on the stage, we see it as the representative of that "ancient tradition and worship" which Mr. Thackeray spoke of. It is not the dress, but the bacchic theory which it represents, that is the true source of the impropriety com-

plained of in such spectacles. In fact, we believe that the dress rather diminishes than enhances the immoral tendencies of the ballet, as it helps to remove it out of the sphere of real life into the region of fable, and away from all similar associations. The effect of twenty young girls going through a regular ballet, and throwing themselves into all the postures which that performance is supposed to demand, attired, at the same time, in the ordinary ball-dress of the period would, in our opinion, be ten times worse. It might be less indecent, but it would certainly be more voluptious. The conclusion seems to be that the complaint of short skirts, tight fleshings, and so forth, rests upon a very weak foundation. But, at the same time, we would not ignore it altogether. There is no reason why the dress of girls engaged in these performances should be reduced below a certain point, and if any shock to the feelings of respectable persons s spared by keeping them at that point, by all means let it be done. To us it does not seem a matter of much moment whether a few inches more or less of the lady's person be exposed to view, if we tolerate a performance the whole spirit of which is such as we have deseribed it to be. The pallet has of late years become much too prominent on the stage, and the true remedy is to curtall its dimensions and charge its character, rather than to lengthen its skirts and augment its petticoats. This remedy the public have in their own hands. and we should not be sorry if they used it .-Once & Week.
