

## HYLAN USES AUTO, LINCOLN WALKED

Bodyguard of Martyred President Compares Journeys of Chief to Mayor's Trips.

"WISH WE HAD ANOTHER"

"Need Him To-day," Says Col. Roberts, Outlining His Life.

A more intimate side to Abraham Lincoln than is outlined in the usual cold biographical facts was presented last night to the Men's Club of St. Stephen's Lutheran Church, Newkirk avenue and East Twenty-eighth street. The speaker was Col. Timothy Roberts, a bodyguard of the murdered President.

"We love Lincoln because he was a man, not part of the time, but all the time," said Col. Roberts. "He stood unflinchingly by his principles, and not that might was right. Ever since a boy of 12 Lincoln abhorred the slave law as a thing unchristian. He fought it from the first day he ever entered politics until it was repealed in 1863."

"Lincoln is said to have been uneducated. He may not have received a college education, but he was an ardent student. He borrowed books and stayed up all night reading them by the light of fires burning on an open hearth in his mud cabin. His wonderful power of oratory came naturally to him. His marvelous speeches in Congress were responsible for his being asked to come to New York on Feb. 17, 1857, to the Cooper Institute, where he addressed an audience composed of the greatest literary critics, authors and professors in the State."

"Known as the 'Country Attorney' he told those present of the horrors caused by the slave law. He used plain, simple language. His arguments were logical, and they were based on truth, not fiction. As a result of that address, Lincoln's son was sent to Harvard the following day. Lincoln was the finest speaker and writer of the English language that ever sat in the Presidential chair."

"Lincoln, in 1832, was a captain in the army in the war against the Black Hawk Indians. His men had done no fighting while the war was in progress. They only met one aged Indian who wished to surrender himself. His men, however,

wanted to kill that Indian. Lincoln warned them that whoever fired a shot at the prisoner would pay with his life. This is just one instance that I name to show how Lincoln treated his prisoners."

"In 1834, Lincoln was elected to the legislature of Illinois. The day after his election he went to the legislature on foot, with a pair of shoes under his arm, and a shawl wrapped around his shoulders for an overcoat. Imagine present-day Tammany Hall representatives going to Albany in their bare feet. If Hylan has to go anywhere he goes there in a fine automobile and makes you and me pay for it."

"Lincoln's death and fight against the slave law, which was passed by Democrats, you all know about. Many books could be filled with incidents about Lincoln. I only wish we had another like him to-day."
