

# BR. LUNENFELD, ILL FOR YEAR, IS DEAD AT 51

Jamaica Dentist and Realty  
Man Also Was Active  
in Politics

Dr. Bernard Lunenfeld, Jamaica dentist and realty man, died at 4 A.M. today at his home, 83-46 167th street, Jamaica, at the age of 51. He had been ill since he suffered a heart attack a year ago.

Dr. Lunenfeld practiced for the last eight years at 158-29 Jamaica avenue, Jamaica, with his son, Dr. Leonard Lunenfeld. Previously he maintained offices for many years in Richmond Hill.

Born in Austria, in 1887, Dr. Lunenfeld came to the United States in his youth. He was educated at New York and Columbia Universities.

He began his practice in Richmond Hill where he lived for 35 years before moving to Jamaica.

He was past president of the Long Island Dental Society, an honorary member of the Police Honor Legion, past master of Council Masonic Lodge, Richmond Hill, former president of the Tamaqua Democratic Club of Jamaica, and a member of the Grand Jurors' Association.

In April, 1936, he filed a petition in bankruptcy in Brooklyn Federal Court, listing liabilities of \$62,757 and no assets.

The bankruptcy resulted, Dr. Lunenfeld stated, from the collapse of his negotiations to build a million-dollar theatre and studio on Jamaica avenue in 1927.

Surviving Dr. Lunenfeld are his wife, Beatrice Gluckman Lunenfeld; a daughter, Hermine; three sons, Dr. Leonard, Raymond and Robert, all of Jamaica; a sister, Mary, the wife of Dr. Isadore Orgel, Jamaica dentist, and a brother, Dr. Julius Lunenfeld, Manhattan dentist.

Funeral services are being arranged.

## Exhibits of Activities of Catholic Charities To Feature Dinner for Bishop on May 19th

### Affair at Jamaica Armory to Climax Annual Appeal

A complete and colorful display of the activities of Catholic Charities and its affiliated organizations will feature the dinner to be tendered at His Excellency, Bishop Thomas E. Molloy of the Diocese of Brooklyn, at the Jamaica Armory, May 19, according to Joseph H. Burkard, general chairman of the men's division of the Bishop's Lay Committee for Catholic Charities which is sponsoring the dinner as a climax to the annual Bishop's Appeal.

Burkard, in announcing the plans of the exhibit committee which is headed by Francis X. Mangani and made up of the Rev. Ambrose McGowan, director of the Health Division of Catholic Charities, and the Rev. Joseph A. Grogan in charge of Youth Activities for Queens, said:

"It is our intent in this exhibit to show how every effort of the Catholic charitable, social and health organizations are coordinated in a program of vast magnitude designed so that not only the poor, the unfortunate and distressed shall benefit, but so that those of sound circumstances may be welded into units in a comprehensive and far-reaching program of social action. It is with this two-fold purpose that we plan such a display of our activities, so that those who wish to join with us may see a graphic presentation of the results of our efforts."

The theme center of the display which will be built around the four walls of the armory, will be a panel 24 feet high dedicated to the various divisions of the Catholic Charities program. This panel will be set off by a life size picture of the Bishop. It has been designed by a well-known scenic artist and will form the center of the exhibit which will extend the entire width of the armory. This exhibit has been laid out to show the coordinating function of Catholic Charities and how the affiliated organizations are welded into a complete program covering social case work, social group work, health and social action.

#### Equipment From Hospital

The Health Division will exhibit equipment from the various hospitals of the four counties of the Brooklyn Diocese. This exhibit will be under the personal direction of Father McGowan and is planned to contain equipment from institutions among which are Mary Immaculate Hospital in Jamaica, St. John's Hospital in Long Island City, St. Joseph's Hospital in Far Rockaway and many others. Ambulances and other equipment will be combined to form a colorful display of the facilities of the health units of Catholic Charities.

In commenting on the Big Brothers exhibit, James F. T. Delaney, president of the Queens Big Brothers, said:

"The proper guidance of our 'little brothers' in channels of constructive activity is one of the most important phases of our work. We continually aim to develop latent talents in these youngsters and the results of our efforts have been most gratifying when one looks at the result of the work."

#### Youth Organizations

Youth organizations under the supervision of Catholic Charities will be featured in the display of the Social Group Division which will be made up of exhibits of the Catholic Boy Scouts, which have had a remarkable growth in the various parishes of the borough during the past year, the Catholic Girl Scouts, the Catholic Boys' Brigade and units of the Junior Naval Militia. A complete Boy Scout Camp will be set up on the armory floor under the personal direction of Father Grogan, director of the Catholic Boy Scouts in Queens. Various other exhibits covering many activities of the Catholic Charities among the youth of Queens will create a background for the entire display of this division.

The display of the Division of Social Action will be made up from among the several affiliated organizations comprising this division and will include a presentation of the activities of the Ladies of Charity of Queens under the direction of Mrs. Rose Greening, president of the group; the Intercollegiate Association of Catholic Women and the Catholic Young Women's Club of Queens. ## NURSE FOUND DEAD IN HOTEL

The body of an Elizabeth, N. J., registered nurse, who apparently died from an overdose of a sedative, was found in her room at the Homestead Hotel, 82-45 Grenfell avenue, Kew Gardens, at 3 P.M. yesterday.

The woman was Anna E. Nash.

A preliminary autopsy report last night said barbital poisoning caused her death. Barbital, a coal tar derivative, is widely used as a sedative.

John Jasmy, a houseman at the hotel, found Miss Nash, clad in a negligee, lying on a bed. He summoned detectives of the Richmond Hill squad, who found a bag containing 42 white pills and a yellow capsule on the woman's dresser.

The woman was pronounced dead by Dr. John Sherburne of 120-12 Kishon avenue, Kew Gardens. She was checked into the hotel at about 9:30 Saturday night and went directly to her room.
